
Fatal neurodegenerative disease

Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, also known as:

Lou Gehrig's Disease



Motor Neuron Disease



Motor neurons in the brain and spinal cord degenerate



Muscles stop responding to signals sent by motor neurons

Progressive body paralysis leading to loss of mobility and speech with no impact on senses
